












NC growth 4th largest among South, 6th nationwide

North Carolina is growing...and it's mostly in urban areas.









Fastest growth in Triangle, Charlotte, Wilmington areas

Population growth rate (%) for NC counties, 2010-2020




Largest population losses in Sandhills, Northeast




Components of Population Change from July 1, 2023






Below Replacement Fertility

Replacement Level
















Older Counties tend to be more rural and economically distressed











Pre-School Aged Kids are the most diverse

Population age structure by sex, 2022











School-Age Children are also more diverse

Population age structure by sex, 2022













Top 3 Sending States to North Carolina, 2021 to 2022



Foreign-born as a share of total population by county, 2021




